0262 *The Epistles of John*

Through an exposition and examination of the Apostle John's three biblical letters, this course will emphasize their biblical theology, their genre, and their life application. (Austin Ariail)

3000 *Introduction to Theology*

What is theology and how does one "do it?" This introduction to the nature of theology begins with the authority of Scripture and orients the student to the basic themes of Christian doctrine. (Ingrim Green)

4003 *Following Christ*

Through a study of the New Testament and an examination of preeminent followers of Christ, students will identify their own personal life mission and explore ways to faithfully respond to Christ's call to follow Him. (Lance Ouellette)

Through an examination of the Scriptures and church history, this course will present the Christian doctrine of the Trinity and its importance for the Christian's faith. (Clinton Patronella)

0228 *Leviticus: "Be Holy as I am Holy"*

Through an exposition of the book of Leviticus which looks at the book in its original setting as well as in its current applications, the student will learn to live a holier life, one set apart to God. (Chuck Rhine)

0244 *The Acts of the Apostles*

Through an exposition of the book of Acts, students will identify the purpose of the book, discover the mission of the Apostles, and re-live the journeys of Paul. (Todd Pinkston)

0254 *Paul's Letters to Timothy*

Through an exposition and an examination of the genre, occasion, purpose, major theme, structure, and argument of Paul's two letters to his "beloved son" Timothy, students will appreciate God's expectation of their servanthood. (Chi-Ping Fu)

1010 *Interpreting Messianic Prophecy*

Tracing messianic prophecy from Genesis to the Gospels, students will compare interpretations of these prophecies during the exile and during the second temple period with their application to Jesus Christ by New Testament authors. (Rob Reid)

4090 *Reconciliation within the Church*

By examining the biblical basis for reconciliation in the church, students will acknowledge that conflict is inevitable, that reconciliation is required, and that, through love, they have the tools to restore broken relationships and bring glory to God. (Barbara D. Johnson)

4100 *Hinduism*

Through an exploration of its history, literature, theology, and practice, students will compare Hinduism, the third largest world religion, with Christianity. (Pau Khup)
